Terry Steiner, of Priest River, gave a talk on the Leave No Trace Training before the meeting. He will be teaching us on skills and techniques June 23-24.

President Marilyn Rousher called the meeting to order at 7:10PM

Guests: Ed & Karen Babbitt, Delbert Payne, Gary Winchles and Sonia Schumacher.

April minutes read. Jerry Shriner motioned to accept, Joyce Bissell 2nd, passed.

GUEST SPEAKER - Ginger Swisher gave a talk on being Consciously Aware on Trails and with Horses. At the request of the membership, Ginger will give an all day clinic at the rate of \$35 per person. Limit of 10.

DE-SPOOKING CLINIC - took place on May 12th. Bob Williams, Bob Funke, Ginger Swisher, Holly Branch and an ISP car who present obstacles and unfamiliar experience to 25 horses. Afterwards about a dozen riders rode up Canfield Mountain.

NATIONAL TRAILS DAY - June 2nd. Joni Lueck Trail Boss. We'll assist the BLM in putting up signage at Blue Creek Bay.

FIRST AID & CPR CLASS - Jill Reineccius has made arrangements with a fire fighter to teach us basic 1st aid at no cost. Will be in June, date, time and location TBD.

LNT TRAINING - June 23- 24. This will be an overnighter with Terry Steiner at Trail # 488 north of Sandpoint. Contact Marilyn Rousher if you wish to go. Limit of 10.

INSURANCE - Marilyn Rousher checked into WA's insurance and it's pretty much the same as ID's. No one will give us coverage for people operating a chainsaw.

MARIE CREEK GRANT - Forest Service wanted treated wood that cost \$46,000, too costly, so no grant.

HEYBURN STATE PARK RIDE OVERNIGHTER & DUTCH OVEN COOKING TRAINING - Has been moved to July 14-15.

RED IVES - Has been moved to July 21-22.

FOURTH of JULY PARADE - We passes on this and will consider it for next year. We also need to plan earlier, by November of this year, for what events we want coverage on for 2013.



Leave No Trace Training - Fri-Sun, June 22-24

The LNT Training is the evening of June 22, between 5:00 - 6:00 PM, where we'll arrive and just hang out. The actual training begins at 8:30 Saturday morning and ends Sunday early afternoon. Terry is going to have us pitch camp about 1/2 mile away from the parking area, so bring your camping gear (or something nicer to sleep in), food and cooking stuff. The location is Trail Head 488, Grouse Creek in Sandpoint.

You can bring your horses for before and after riding, but Terry says the trail is hard. Open to only 10 people, **SIGN-UP BY JUNE 18TH** by contacting Marilyn Rousher at 208-755-8112 or mustanggranny55@yahoo.com.

Directions: Take Hwy 200, East out of Sandpoint, crossing under I-95. Go 6 miles to Colburn Culver Rd, turn Left and go 5.5 miles to Grouse Creek Cutoff, turn Right. Stay on Grouse Creek Cutoff as it twists and turns till you get



to Grouse Creek Road, turn Right and go 11 miles till end of road, which is the 488 trail head. If you get lost call (208) 263-6534 and Bonnie will help you out.

<u>Directions:</u> Coming from west: Take I-90 to 4th of July Recreation Area, exit #28. Stop at stop sign. Turn right and stay right back to parking lot about 1/4 mile. Coming from east: Take the 4th of July Recreation Area exit #28. Stop at stop sign. Turn left and drive over freeway. Then turn right and stay right back to the parking area about 1/4 mile. Watch for PBCH signage.

De-Spooking Clinic - May 12

Twenty-five horses attended and all of them, along with their people seemed to enjoy themselves. Maybe the group dynamics helped because none of our equine buddies decided that learning new things was not in their line of work.

PBCH member, and ISP officer Holly Branch helped-out, I think the most fun she had was throwing fire crackers at the far end of the arena to simulate gun fire. A few horses danced in place wondering what the heck was going on, but all in all there was peace in the herd. I took loads of photos, too many to include in this edition of our newsletter. Our hard working newsletter editor, Debbie Samovar, will have a disk of all of the photos to use as she pleases. Maybe a few will end up on the web-site. I know that some will be in the upcoming edition of the State Newsletter, *Broomtales*.

Other hurdles encountered and overcome included a "car wash" made by Bob Williams just in case we are in town and need to clean up, a wooden bridge in case we run into water crossings, ground poles to simulate downed logs, a tent and a tarp (who knows when we will need to go past, or over as one horse did), balls (a very fine paint decided that soccer should be his new career choice) and last but by no means least an ISP patrol car!

Now, the patrol car was something to take note of for several reasons. One, how often do you see an ISP vehicle that is not shiny and clean? I was impressed and grateful that the officer was willing to drive his rig around and around the dusty Dalton Gardens riding arena. I know he had to wash his car as soon as he left and he deserves a very hardy "thank you" for his efforts. Next, how often do you see flashing lights and hear sirens without them being behind you (pulled over anyone?) or dashing off to the scene of a mishap?

Our patrol officer turned on lights and sirens in increments to give the horses the opportunity to get used to the kind of fuss that usually send chills down the spines of us all. By the end of the session, the PBCH horse squad was chasing the patrol car around the arena with sirens and lights going strong. When was the last time you saw that? Never I would expect, but if we are riding down a dirt road and an ISP officer happens to be coming our way we know that we won't encounter a neck wrenching spook. We also know that the folks in ISP are not only willing to lay down their lives for us, but also help us train our horses. We should be thanking these brave people for all that they do for our community, just like we do to our troops. Would it hurt to walk up to an officer and say "thank you for your service"? That is what I plan to do the next time I run into one (as long as that is not a literal statement, of course).

I received lots of praise and thanks for the De-spooking Clinic from members who attended. I also heard some laments from several who did not. Overall, there was a request to have another one next year, but that is not up to me, that is up to the hard working team who put it on - Bob and Ginger and the volunteers who helped them out.

Fish Trap Ride - May 26

Nine Panhandle members met at The Fishtrap BLM farmhouse located in the lower southwest corner of Spokane County on May 26 for a ride through part of the Channeled Scablands with their many hills and deep grassy coulees. The ride was co-led by Michelle LeVar and Marilyn Rousher, with Michelle being the trail and botanical guide, and great assistance in moving through the cattle that are being pastured in this area. Vivid pink Bitterroot dotted the trail along with numerous other wildflowers. The ride route led the group past the Folsom farm that was established from Railroad land at the turn of the19th century. The barn , some out buildings and several antique farm implements can be seen from the trail - a stark reminder of the incredible amount of work these pioneers did to make a living. From there the trail led through outstanding examples of Mima mounds, ponds, and evidence everywhere of the power of the Missoula Floods.

At Hog Lake the riders viewed the 'stepped' falls that are in full flow, and an example of a volcanic dike extruded 17 million years ago along the bluff on the far side of the lake. The ride continued the length of Hog Lake and along Hog Canyon Creek that flows into Fishtrap Lake. Great fishing in both lakes, for those with a rod and reel. In this area the riders encountered a herd of cattle they moved quietly around, even though some of the horses had never seen cattle before. Continuing on through day long strong winds the riders arrived back at the Miller

farm house with smiles on their faces, and capped the day off with lunch while the horses rested.

A great day for horses and riders, and a fine job by Michelle and Marilyn. Thanks to you both, and to those who participated and made the day memorable.

PBCH COMMITTED TO DEVELOPING TRAILS AT BLUE CREEK BAY

June 2, 2012, National Trails Day, PBCH work project. Joni Lueck, Trail Boss of the Blue Creek project, has been working for a couple of months now with BLM Outdoor Recreation Program Director Kurt Pindel. Her efforts have not gone unrewarded as twelve hardy members arrived early Saturday morning ready to dig holes and replace fencing, and armed with shovels and wheel barrows to move top soil.

The weather did not cooperate much, overcast and a constant drizzle soaked many "underdressed" participants to the bone. As soon as the project was completed, Mother Nature turned off the faucet and the sun came out (at least for a minute or two).

The group met at 9:00, had a quick introduction to the new Blue Creek Trailhead and the future plans which involve miles of new hiking and riding trails. This has been an ongoing BLM project that began in 2007 and will continue to improve and grow through the next few years. As new participants in the creation of this nearby facility, we have been offered the opportunity to help construct and mark trails, and install horse and bike access gates.

Since opportunity is knocking, Mr. Pindel has agreed to allow PBCH to help mark new riding trails and install horse, bike, hiker entry gates.

These kinds of prospects don't happen often and we need to make our horse needs known. BLM Manager, Mr. Pindel, is open to any suggestions we as a riding group have to make the area horse friendly. Ideas on dimensions and materials to construct the entrances, size and height of riding trails and parking ideas are now open subjects that all of us need to consider.

The BOD is going to be discussing these issues at the June 4th meeting so that our wagons can be hitched and ready to roll. Deb Samovar will be sending out updates and times for these work parties and I hope that another twelve volunteers, and more, will arrive ready to put in a couple of hours of dirt time so as to construct this new riding area, which encompasses 630 acres.

So far a fantastic fishing dock, parking and picnic area (with bathroom facilities) has been completed. Right out of the fishing dock area is a riding trail that will need some work, but will be convenient and scenic. Up the road a short way is the main trailhead area featuring car and horse trailer parking. There are some hitching posts, (bathroom facilities), an area for ranger talks and the beginning of some more picturesque riding. This trail area can be reached from another trailhead location about a half mile down the road where there are cut outs for horse trailer parking as well. A loop can be made from the upper location to the main location and then a ride can be continued by crossing the road and following trails to the fishing dock area.

I don't know about you, but I am excited about a new place that is close by where I can ride a few hours with people who aren't ready to take on Marie Creek or Heyburn. Let's all get together and plan on being at these work parties so we can be a part of something new and fun.




